Course Objectives

- 1. Develop an understanding of the basic concepts of common and statutory law.
- 2 Identify and address current legal issues of importance at the personal and professional level.
- 3. Develop an understanding of risk.
- 4. Develop solutions for managing risk.
- 5. Interrelate the concepts of risk management and law in limiting exposure to legal liability through case law examples.

Attendance

Attendance is important. The student's success in this class will be dependent upon their participation and the amount and quality of effort expended. Students will be held responsible for material covered in class. Absences can be costly. Roll will be taken. Students engaged in officially sanctioned University of Florida activities are encouraged to provide this information to the instructor during the first week of classes.

If an assignment is submitted that does not meet the template requirements noted in these course materials, that assignment will either receive the grade of P- or F.
