Course Objectives

- 1. Develop an understanding of the basic concepts of common and statutory law.
- 2. Identify and address current legal issues of importance at the personal and professional level.
- 3. Develop an understanding of risk.
- 4. Develop solutions for managing risk.
- 5. Interrelate the concepts of risk management and law in limiting exposure to legal liability through case law examples.

Attendance
