Course Objectives

- 1. Introduce the Student to Agricultural Law
- 2. To encourage the student's analysis of legal issues and concepts as applied to agriculture
- 3. To generate critical thinking in matters related to agricultural production, natural resources, and environmental policy

Attendance

Assignments

Assignments are to consist of a <u>full page</u> of typed text - **double-spaced/12point font with 1 - inch margins (page 20)**.
