Course Description:

The course is designed to aid students in achieving a smooth transition to the University of Florida. Students will explore the richness and diversity of CALS and UF; debate issues at the intersection of society and food, agricultural and resources at the local, state, national, and international levels; and develop mentoring relationships with faculty.

Three broad components are addressed this semester: professionalism, educational discovery opportunities, and critical food and resource system issues.

The activities will include researching and presenting topics for discussion; reviewing study skills for reading, writing, and speaking as they apply to critical issues; understanding the scope of agriculture, food and resources, and the broad range of career opportunities open to FRE graduates. The course will enhance students' abilities to study and effectively participate within the entire university community.

Course Objectives

Students will acquire skills for success, learn how to cope with the system, explore the range of education opportunities available to them at UF, establish mentoring relationships, and understand the scope and role of agriculture in today's society.
